

THE PRACTICE:

This is usually followed by an interactive session through which students can learn how they reached their present reputation and also how the College contributed to this process.

Padmashree Prof. Nirupam Bajpai, Senior Advisor, Sustainable Development, The Earth Institute, Columbia University, was invited on 20'th August to speak on Millennium Development Goals: Successes and Failures.

As an economist who was himself a member of the Millennium Development Goals Committee, he was the most suitable person to enlighten the audience about the global scenario in this respect.

TITLE OF PRACTICE: Teaching at Tandem

GOAL: To create an opportunity for the learners to understand a concept or a module from syllabi from the point of view of various disciplines at once, thus allowing a synthesized and wholesome understanding of the topic.

THE CONTEXT:

All knowledge is one. Different subjects approach it from different perspective. While every subject takes up a specific aspect of knowledge as a whole, it also limits the possibility of a wholesome grasp of the topics in the syllabi.

Awe is an important motivator especially in the process of learning and Teaching at Tandem has a potential to whet that feeling. It can also be a learning experience for the faculty members, who might discover the nuances of the subject more fully, along with their learned colleagues. Teaching at Tandem can produce the synergy between teachers and learners that may even contribute to healthier relationship between the teachers and the taught which can go a long way in improving the overall eco-system of the institution. In today's world where the barriers between disciplines are rapidly diminishing, and a learner is expected to adopt an interdisciplinary approach Teaching at Tandem is a ready platform for the learners for this sort of an exposure.

THE PRACTICE:

IQAC initiated this practice, and held a pilot session on 15/03/2018. The theme of the session was: The Agrarian Crisis. Three departments were engaged at Tandem, They were: Department of Marathi, Sociology and Economics. Dr. Khomne from department of Marathi explained a poem that narrated the pathos of a farmer who, burdened in debt, finally decides to end his life. Dr. Surrendra Thakur from Sociology department illustrated the sociological theories behind suicide and enlightened the listeners with the findings of a study he had conducted, relating to the condition of the wives who survive after the farmers commit suiside. Finally Dr. Suchita Krishnaprasad brought out the economics of agriculture and explained how the terms of trade are naturally unfair for agriculture in comparison to that of the industry.

Later, the IQAC came up with guidelines to ensure that Teaching at Tandem becomes a sustainable practice, as follows:

- 1. Heads of the departments can conduct meetings to identify the topics in their syllabi that permit TaT sessions along with the subjects with whom these sessions can be held.
- 2. Faculty from different departments can together arrive at a list of TaT sessions they can possibly conduct.
 - 3. Decide the class room and timing of the session that does not disturb the routine time table.
- 4. Inform the IQAC in writing about the conduct of a session, and obtain the required forms from IQAC for the documentation.

5. Analyse the feedback and document it.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

The session was attended by all the students of FY and SYBA, whether or not they had opted for all

the three subjects: Marathi, Sociology and Economics. It was originally planned for an hour. But the students' response was phenomenal! What followed was an animated discussion between the students

over the issues regarding the crisis relating to agriculture and the policy choices.

Students were keen to know about the next session of TaT (Teaching at Tandem)!

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:

The beauty of the practice is that it involves no financial cost. It only utilizes the existing man power in a more meaningful manner! But the difficulties arise in terms of adjusting a session within the

timetable. The students and staff engaged in different departments may not find it easy to find a

common time and place to hold a session that is convenient to all.

NOTES:

This can certainly become a sustainable best practice for an enriching experience for learners as well

as teachers.
